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Issue

The issue presented for review by the Appeals Unit of NY State of Health is:

Did the Marketplace properly find that you, your spouse and 23 year old child were not eligible for a special enrollment period to enroll in a qualified health plan?

Procedural History

On July 28, 2015, the Marketplace issued an eligibility determination that you are conditionally eligible and your spouse and child are eligible for up to \$564.00 monthly of advance premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions. The notice states that you, your spouse and child do not qualify to select a health plan outside of the open enrollment period.

On July 29, 2015 you spoke with the Marketplace's Account Review Unit and appealed the denial of a special enrollment period.

On October 15, 2015 you had a telephone hearing with a Hearing Officer from the Marketplace's Appeals Unit. The record was developed during the hearing and closed at the end of the hearing. The record is now closed.

Findings of Fact

A review of the record supports the following findings of fact:

- 1) You testified that you, your spouse and twenty-three year old child are seeking to enroll in a health plan through the Marketplace.

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- 2) You testified that were enrolled in employer-sponsored-insurance until March 31, 2015.
- 3) You applied for health insurance through the Marketplace on July 27, 2015.
- 4) You testified that you were not aware that there was a deadline to enroll in health coverage through the Marketplace.
- 5) On July 28, 2015, the Marketplace issued an eligibility determination notice stating that you, your spouse and child do not qualify to select a health plan outside of the open enrollment period.

Conflicting evidence, if any, was considered and found to be less credible than the evidence noted above.

Applicable Law and Regulations

Special Enrollment Period

The Marketplace must provide an initial open enrollment period and annual open enrollment periods during which time qualified individuals may enroll in a qualified health plan (QHP) and enrollees may change QHPs (45 CFR § 155.410(a)). The open enrollment period for the 2015 calendar year began November 15, 2014 and ended on February 15, 2015 (45 CFR § 155.410(e)(1)).

After each open enrollment period ends, the Marketplace provides special enrollment periods to qualified individuals. During a special enrollment period, a qualified individual may enroll in a QHP and an enrollee may change to another QHP. A special enrollment period may be permitted when one of the following triggering events occurs:

- 1) The qualified individual or his or her dependent
 - i) loses health insurance considered to be minimum essential coverage
 - ii) is enrolled in a non-calendar-year health insurance policy, even if they have the option to renew the policy
 - iii) loses pregnancy-related coverage
 - iv) loses medically needy coverage

- 2) The qualified individual gains a dependent or becomes a dependent through marriage, birth, adoption, placement for adoption, or placement in foster care
- 3) The qualified individual or his or her dependent, who was not previously a citizen, national, or lawfully present individual gains such status
- 4) The qualified individual's or his or her dependent's, enrollment or non-enrollment in a QHP is unintentional, inadvertent, or erroneous and is the result of the error, misrepresentation, or inaction of an officer, employee, or agent of the Exchange or HHS, or its instrumentalities as evaluated and determined by the Exchange
- 5) The enrollee or dependent adequately demonstrates to the Exchange that the QHP in which he or she is enrolled substantially violated a material provision of its contract in relation to the enrollee
- 6) The enrollee or enrollee's dependent is newly eligible or ineligible for advance payments of the premium tax credit, or change in eligibility for cost-sharing reductions
- 7) The qualified individual, enrollee, or their dependent, gains access to new QHPs as a result of a permanent move
- 8) The qualified individual who is an Indian may enroll in a QHP or change from one QHP to another one time per month
- 9) The qualified individual or enrollee, or their dependent, demonstrates to the Exchange, in accordance with guidelines issued by HHS, that the individual meets other exceptional circumstances as the Exchange may provide
- 10) A qualified individual or enrollee, or his or her dependents, was not enrolled in QHP coverage or is eligible for but is not receiving advance payments of the premium tax credit or cost-sharing reductions as a result of misconduct on the part of a non-Exchange entity providing enrollment assistance or conducting enrollment activities.

(45 CFR § 155.420(d)).

As a general rule, a qualified individual or enrollee has 60 days from the date of a triggering event to select a QHP (45 CFR §155.420(c)(1)). A qualified individual or his or her dependent who loses health insurance considered to be minimum essential coverage has 60 days before or after to loss of eligibility for qualifying coverage in an eligible employer-sponsored plan to select a QHP (45 CFR § 155.420(c)(2)(ii)).

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Legal Analysis

The issue under appeal is whether or not the Marketplace correctly determined that you, your spouse and child were not eligible for a special enrollment period on July 28, 2015.

The Marketplace provided an open enrollment from November 15, 2014 until February 15, 2015.

Once the annual open enrollment period ends, a health plan enrollee must qualify for a special enrollment period in order to enroll in a health plan offered in the Marketplace.

Federal regulations provide that a qualified individual has 60 days from the date of a triggering event to select a qualified health plan (QHP) in the Marketplace.

Losing your health insurance coverage as of March 31, 2015 was a triggering event that qualified you for a 60-day special enrollment period. The special enrollment period began on the date of your triggering event, March 31, 2015, and ran for a 60-day period, expiring on May 30, 2105. You were eligible to enroll in a health plan during this 60-day period, but failed to do so.

The facts as set out in the record do not suggest that any other triggering event described in 45 CFR § 155.420(d) has occurred.

Therefore, the Marketplace's determination to deny a special enrollment period is **AFFIRMED**.

Decision

The July 28, 2015 eligibility determination notice is **AFFIRMED**.

This decision does not change your eligibility.

You, your spouse and 23 year old child do not qualify for a special enrollment period after May 30, 2015.

You may bring a lawsuit on any Appeals Unit decision in New York State court in accordance with Article 78 of the New York Civil Practice Law and Rules. This must be done within four months after the date of the Decision Date, which appears on the first page of this Decision.

Additionally, Appeals Unit decisions on issues involving eligibility for qualified health plans, advance premium tax credits, and cost-sharing reductions may be appealed to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. This must be done within 30 days of the date of the Decision Date, which appears on the first page of this Decision (45 CFR § 155.520(c)).

If you wish to be represented by an attorney in bringing an outside appeal and do not know how to go about getting one, you may contact legal resources available to you. You may, for example, contact the local County Bar Association, Legal Aid, or Legal Services.
